

Compost Formula

Three to four parts carbon (sometimes referred to as "browns" or "dry material" (dry leaves, dry grass, shredded newsprint)

One part nitrogen (sometimes referred to as "green" or wet green fresh cut grass, kitchen scraps, garden waste, manure) keep it moist as a damp sponge

Ideally having contact with the soil is preferred. Worms help breakdown the material, when it gets too hot they go away, and then they come back when it's cooler to finish the job. Yet, there's enough bacteria on leaves in a rolling composter to get microbial activity and breakdown, it may be a little slower to get the finished compost.

Remember to keep the pile of material aerated. . .and you will have compost in a short time.
